I am writing this letter to encourage the release of a young man who has been wrongly imprisoned in the first place, and for years too long, compounding the terrible error. His name is P. F. Lazor.

Rather, he has been an asset to his community, and probably done more positive things in his young life than most people could claim. I feel that upon release he will again become involved in actively showing his love for his fellow man.

As a woman and mother, I have compassion and concern for those unable to defend themselves from evil doers. And nowadays, for whatever reason, child molesters are set free in record time. Their names and addresses are being made available at police departments down here, in case parents are suspicious of a neighbor. Then I suppose they can move, or watch their children and the suspect 24 hours a day!! There is something mighty strange in a system which keeps a wrongly-imprisoned person like PF behind bars, and frees the proven attackers of defenseless children! Don't you agree, Mr. Nielsen?

We need good and caring people in our communities today, more than ever before. I plead with you to release P. F. Lazor now.
